A famous old adage goes, "actions speak louder than words." A wonderful couple at Baptist Village of Oklahoma City personifies this axiom.

Gilbert (Gil) and Genevie Kettler have a humble, soft-spoken spirit. But thanks to their servant-minded attitudes, their presence is strongly felt for Baptist Village Communities (BVC) and beyond.

The Kettlers have called the Village home for five years now. California was their home for 37 years. While there, Gil taught middle school math for three decades, and Genevie also served in the classroom as a teacher's aide.

They returned to Oklahoma in 2004, which brought them much closer to their original stomping grounds. Genevie grew up in Lindsay, OK, while Gil is a Texas native.

They moved to the Village in 2012, and the Kettlers enjoy it very much. "We enjoy being here. I don't have to cut the grass or anything," says Gil.

"Plus, there's something going on here on campus every day. Many opportunities to take trips and participate. You develop relationships."

Though the Kettlers don't seem to be ones for the spotlight, their services were soon utilized upon moving to the Village. Director of Chaplain Services Chris Finley made sure of that.

"Chaplain Chris got Gil involved in several things at the Village," says Genevie. One of these many avenues is church services at T.B. Lackey Health Center on campus. On Wednesday afternoons, Gil can be found serving alongside Chaplain Finley and the Singin' Saints resident choir, of which Gil is a member. He's also a member of the Village resident council.

Not to be outdone, Genevie plays an integral role in the annual Back to School Bash at the Village. She, fellow resident Joyce Shelby and others organize large quantities of resident-donated school supplies into gifts for Village Friends Team members' children.

Friday afternoon is a great time to find Gil busy serving again, this time in the Rehab Neighborhoods. He and others man the greeters' desk in the main entry, welcoming guests and family to the Village and providing them with direction and a friendly face.

Gil and Genevie serve alongside each other in multiple ways. A nearby elementary school, Harvest Hills, is honored to have them and other residents visit the school on Mondays. They have the opportunity to mentor students there and give them support.

A well-known organization also has been a passion of theirs over the years. For quite some time, the Kettlers have worked with Gideon's International, an organization known for distributing God's Word all over the country and the world. This even included a special journey with Gideon's to Russia.

Recently, Gil and Genevie have found another way to give back to the place they call home – through the Baptist Foundation of Oklahoma and BVC's Adams Assistance Fund.

It was a natural combination. "We met with Kathy Lee (Hatchett) and completed a charitable gift annuity plan," says Gil. "We had several places that we wanted to include in our giving."

Turns out the Adams Assistance Fund was one of the benefactors of the plan. When asked why they decided to give to the Adams Fund, Gil replied, chuckling, "Because we may need that Fund one day!" He continued, "The Village seems like a place that could really benefit from the Adams Fund. We know that things in life can get expensive. So this is a way we can give back to something worthwhile."

"We're happy to help those who really need it."

Whether serving in wide and varied capacities at Baptist Village of Oklahoma City or giving generously to the Adams Assistance Fund, Gil and Genevie Kettler truly are selfless servants.

"You turn around, and the Kettlers are there," says Chris Finley. "Great volunteers. They know what we need without us even asking them. They are very unassuming and humble, but we couldn't do what we do without them."

## LAKE TEXOMA AND OKLAHOMA CITY WELCOME NEW LEADERSHIP

God has a tendency of providing exactly what we need at exactly the right time. Two new Baptist Village Communities (BVC) leaders are living proof.

BVC is excited to introduce Baptist Village Lake Texoma's new campus director, Lindsi Skinner, and Baptist Village of Oklahoma City's new assistant campus director, James Duehning.

Their paths to BVC certainly were different, but God's hand was undoubtedly upon both transitions.

Lindsi's journey to us came about in an unexpected way.

"Growing up in Muskogee, OK, I lived with my grandpa and dad," says Lindsi. "I didn't know it at the time, but I realize now that I was developing a passion for aging services, especially for families transitioning into a different home environment and how challenging that can be."

She recalls, "I was at a celebration for one of my friend's grandmothers. I ended up talking to a lady whose daughter and I attended high school together. I told her I was concerned about what I

wanted to do, as I was getting ready to graduate college."

"God definitely has a way of surprising you. Lo and behold, this lady just happened to be related to (BVC president) Dr. Bill Pierce. She gave me his contact information."

Lindsi, while a student at Oklahoma Baptist University, had written her senior thesis on Medicare and Medicaid. She emailed Dr. Pierce about how much she loved the aging services profession and sent him a copy of her thesis.

"He emailed right back and asked if I would like to come to the Home Office and talk. Of course, I said yes!"

Lindsi told Dr. Pierce that she had some job opportunities lined up, but none of them were what she really wanted to do. Her degree is in communications studies, but her passion is aging services.

Turns out the meeting was more than just coincidence.



"Dr. Pierce informed me that (former campus director) James Rosson and his wife Nancie were making a transition to Ardmore to be close to family. He then said that BVC had been praying for a campus director, and that I was 'the only one that showed up!"

"After that, I returned to my car and almost cried with happiness. This is exactly what I also had been praying about and is what I wanted to do. After a dinner meeting in Broken Arrow with several others and meeting with James at Lake Texoma, I knew that I wanted to do it - and I'm totally loving it!"

James Duehning brings a great deal of professional experience to his new role at Baptist Village of Oklahoma City, where he also serves as director for T.B. Lackey Health Center.

James has worked in virtually every level of service Baptist Village of Oklahoma City offers, from residential living and assistance in living to skilled nursing and memory support. And much like Lindsi, God opened up a door for him at just the right time.

"I've always been in healthcare. I love this field, but I had reached a crossroads at my previous job. It was at that moment in time that Dr. Pierce reached out to me. I'd known he and Steve Thomas for quite some time, but there hadn't been an opportunity available to me with Baptist Village in the past."

He continues, "When (former administrator)
Michelle Billings made the decision to move close
to family in New York, it opened up the opportunity
I had been looking for. The timing was
definitely right. I'd been wanting to serve with BVC
for a while, and it just all fell into place."

James has worked in this field for a long time, serving in communities in Oklahoma, Nebraska, Kansas and Texas. He's been in a management role since 2001.

He is the first to attest, though, that BVC is different from any other place he's served.

"The atmosphere, moving from my previous experiences to Baptist Village, has been a huge change for the better. It's hard to put into words. Here, it truly is about the people we serve. It was evident within the first week. You can tell Baptist Village Communities truly cares about people. It's not just words on a board, 'this is what we do.'"

Lindsi also quickly realized BVC is special.

"What excited me most about Baptist Village was the concept of 'Serving Together'. I had never heard anything like that before. I'm not just serving them, and they're not just serving me. We're serving together. I just thought that was the coolest thing ever."

At BVC, residents are placed before the task. This results in enhanced lives for the residents and a wonderful camaraderie with the Friends Team.

"When I had my first resident move in, I was so excited to get to know him," says Lindsi. "At first, he was a little upset, saying that he felt bad I had to assist him and do a couple of things for him. I told him, 'Well first off, you've served your entire life, so let me serve you now. But tomorrow, you get to serve me!"

James agrees. "If you're in this field for the right reasons, it's all about the residents. Getting to know them, getting to know their stories. The Friends Team knows that and is bought into the idea. It makes you want to stay in this field. Even on the tougher days, all I have to do is walk in and see the residents and it automatically makes my day better."

What also impressed both Lindsi and James was not just the wonderful residents, but the equally great Friends Team that welcomed them.

"There are many team members here that have served for five, 10, 15, 20 years or more," says James. "People don't stick with a company that doesn't care about them. It's clear that BVC invests in its people, and that's put back into the ministry."

"It's such a family environment," says Lindsi. "When I wake up in the morning and go get coffee, there are my fellow team members and residents there. We chat and do our thing together."

It all goes back to prove God is always in control.

Says Lindsi, "All of those fleeting thoughts and things you really want to do but don't think they are possible or achievable - God likes to prove you wrong. And I'm glad he did!"

## JIM KOLB LOVES HELPING OTHERS

Jim Kolb doesn't like to sit down. It has become pretty apparent that all the 80-year-old wants to do is be active.

Jim has been a resident of Baptist Village Lake Texoma since 2016. Hailing from Dayton, Ohio, he moved to Oklahoma to be closer to his three sons, who live in nearby Durant and Madill. As a matter of fact, he gets to see his youngest son, Gary, daily. Gary serves as director of environmental services for the Village.

Mr. Kolb has lived and worked in nine states. He is a retired field technical supervisor, which explains his extensive travel in the states as well as in Europe.

He has always been independent. He moved all on his own from Ohio to Baptist Village – at 79 years of age. His active spirit soon took shape at the Village.

"I love working outside," says Jim. "It seems like every place I've lived, I've landscaped. I fixed up my home in Ohio and made it look beautiful. When I arrived at the Village, I noticed that my skills could be put to use here. When I learned that the residents here could serve too, I thought 'hey, that's great exercise for me.' So I got out there and started working away."

Jim has become a default associate maintenance man. He has greatly enhanced the aesthetics of the Lake Texoma campus; trimming trees, hedges and clearing brush. About five months ago, he saw another opportunity to make a difference.

"I was cutting trees one day and saw a branch that had a 90-degree angle on it. I thought to myself...'I wonder if I could make a walking cane out of that.'"

That is exactly what Jim did. In fact, he has made upwards of 20 canes since then. He hand-carves nearly every feature on each cane, personalizing each one into unique creations. He has since sold some canes and donated others for people to enjoy and use.

"I'm perhaps not as social as some people. But I know everybody here and am willing to help anyone here. If a resident's TV goes out, they let me know and I can fix it for them. I've also helped move furniture in an apartment."

Campus Director Lindsi Skinner is quick to sing praises for Jim and what he brings to the Village.

"It is truly a privilege to know Jim Kolb. I have never met someone so willing to do anything for anybody at any time. Jim is a good man, willing to talk, willing to listen, and willing to help. Anyone who knows him would say he is a true treasure at Baptist Village Lake Texoma. He is constantly outside working on a project; he makes our Village look so nice."

Jim enjoys living at the Village, but even more so contributing to its appearance and environment.

"I like the Village. I love being active. I can't stand just sitting down. I've gotten to the point where I don't hardly watch television anymore. I'm just go, go, go."

Fast forward to 1984. Baptist Village of Okmulgee was about to be opened, and Annetta was there. In fact, she was one of the first residents to move in when it opened 33 years ago.

"It's a nice place to live," says Annetta. "And now that I'm 96, most of the residents here are upwards of a generation younger than me! But it's fun, because they talk to me, and I talk to them, and between the two generations, we come up with something entertaining."

Entertaining is a good word for life with Annetta. "She has a wicked sense of humor," attests Sherri Powell, Baptist Village of Okmulgee campus director. "She is very spry and can outrun anyone 40 years her junior in the neighborhoods!"

Annetta loves sharing that spirit with others. "I wake up every morning and praise the Lord that I'm here. It's delightful. I like radiating joy to people or saying something nice to someone who needs it. It takes more muscles to frown then it does to smile!"

Baptist Village of Okmulgee smiles when they think of Annetta and the happiness she brings to Village life.
